Hello to all NHS members.

I would like to thank all our speakers this winter for their participation in our lecture series. From a musical history of a genuine Newfoundland diva, to the little known story of the province's correctional institutions, and an introduction to facets of our legal history, we have been informed and entertained by first rate scholars, musicians and singers. It has been a varied and rich winter of meetings.

In the latest provincial budget the Government announced plans to introduce a high school course on the history of Newfoundland and Labrador. For several years the NHS and other interested heritage organizations lobbied hard for such a course and achieved partial success two years ago with the launching of the grade eight course. Though happy with that progress, we all felt that a senior course was preferable. We were about to begin lobbying for this next step, but are pleased that with the Government's recent decision we can now put our time and energies elsewhere. We congratulate the Government on this wise move and will be pleased to provide any requested advice and assistance in planning the new history course.

This spring we are extending our regular offerings a bit. In April we will have our annual general meeting and hear a lecture by the always entertaining Dr. Patrick O'Flaherty on the always fascinating Richard Squires. In May we will be cooperating with the Newfoundland youth sympathy choir to provide some historical context for their new opera based on Kevin Major's poem "Ann and Seamus." On the first weekend in June (2-3) we will work with the Trinity Historical Society to present a conference marking the 90th anniversary of the battle of the Somme, and the tragedy of Beaumont Hamel. Kevin Major will read from his work and speakers will discuss such topics as the role of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment in World War One, the lesser known story of the Naval Reserves, Dr. Cluny Macpherson's wartime service, POW correspondence, and the role of the Women's Patriotic Association. We will end with a banquet on Saturday night (June 2) where Bert Riggs will speak on Trinity in World War One. We hope many of you will be able to join us there. Look for more details and updates on our website. If you have any questions about accommodation in Trinity, please contact our office.

We envision the Trinity conference as part one of a two part symposium on World War One. The second part, to be held in St. John's from October 19-21, will focus a little more narrowly on the theme of war and remembrance. How did participants deal with their war experience during and immediately after the conflict? How did later generations understand, commemorate and write about the war? We will look at the memoirs of participants, the short and long-term impact on both servicemen and civilians, and examine the ways in which the country (and later, the province) commemorated the war, and particularly the horror of July1, 1916. In addition to a line-up of local speakers we will be inviting leading scholars from France, Great Britain and Canada to bring the viewpoint of historians from these closely allied nations. From the annals of the Society's own archives we celebrated our .00th anniversary in 2005, and enjoyed the oral presentations and literary works of our local scholars on topics such as the famous photographer, Robert Edwards Holloway and the history of whaling in Newfoundland. The George Story Lecture - April 27, 2006

Dr. Patrick O'Flaherty

Eminent writer and English professor Dr. Patrick O'Flaherty will address the Society as the George Story Lecturer on April 27. Dr. O'Flaherty has been a commentator on Newfoundland literature, history and current affairs for four decades. He is the author of standard and landmark works such as *The Rock Observed* (1979), *Part of the Main* (1983), *Come Near at Your Peril* (1994), *Old Newfoundland* (1999), and novels such as *Priest of God* (1989) and *Benny's Island* (1994).

His latest history - *Lost Country: The rise and fall of Newfoundland, 1843 – 1933* (2005), which will be available for sale after the lecture. Dr. O'Flaherty is a longtime NHS member and has been kind enough to address the society in the past. He will be introduced by Dr. Helen Peters.

New Discovery at Cupids

Excavations conducted at Cupids since 2002 have produced evidence of the enclosure erected by John Guy and his party in the fall of 1610. Recent research has allowed us to produce a map showing the projected outline of this enclosure based on the data recovered to date. The map, a photograph, and a brief discussion have sen posted in the 'New Discoveries' section of the Baccalieu Trail Archaeology website. New Book Municipal Designation of Cemeteries and the Historic Places Initiative


