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

Cook's Landing: St. Alban's, Bay d'Espoir, Newfoundland.

Cradled away in the inner mountains of the South Coast of Newfoundland lies rich soil, sparkling clean water, thick healthy forest and land rich in natural resources – Bay d'Espoir. Captain James Cook would discover this extraordinary place as he mapped Newfoundland for Britain during the 1760's, and wonder at its amazing potential.

Captain Cook did the first survey of the Bay d'Espoir area around 1765. During his travels along the South Coast of the Island, he described Bay d'Espoir's forest as having "great and plenty of all sorts of wood, common to this country...". (Captain James Cook, Logbook, 1766, 18)

The Town of St. Alban's, in partnership with its Heritage Society, has captured Cook's thoughts of the area by developing "Cook's Landing" in the heart of the community. The history of Ship Cove, now called St. Alban's, is depicted in a number of interpretation pieces on Cook's adventures as he sails into the community. Cook's Landing is located on Birchy Point in St. Alban's, the exact spot where James Cook had repairs done to his ship before continuing on with his work in charting the coast of Newfoundland.
