Continuing our series on provincial historical organizations, we are pleased to present this item on the Agricultural History Society of Newfoundland and Labrador.

POTATOES AND FISH!

The history of Newfoundland and Labrador has been traditionally bound up with the fishery. Fishing families ate a lot of fish. But - they ate their vegetables too!

Since 1986 the Agricultural History Society of Newfoundland and Labrador has worked to raise the profile of agriculture in the province's historical mindset. Our plan has been to focus on projects - some specific, and some on-going. These are developed with the agricultural community and shared with a wider public through exhibits, articles, and events.

We developed major exhibits on The History of Agriculture in Newfoundland and Labrador in 1989 and 1997. Smaller exhibits include Potatoes in Newfoundland and Labrador, 2008, which honours the research career of Kenneth Proudfoot, potato breeder. The Practice of Gardens 2009-2010, and Root Cellars, 2011, have added more exhibit panels to our collection. Our Root Cellar inventory is listed with the Digital Archives Initiative at MUN library.

We have developed an on-going Century Farm Award to honour those farm families who have farmed the same property continuously for one hundred years. This award is presented at industry events. Profiles of the Century Farms are added to our archives and exhibit material and also can be viewed at www.heritagefoundation.ca. Another long-term project is archival in nature. We encourage members of the agricultural community to donate documents which we in turn deposit in the Archives and Special Collections at Memorial University. In this way, we grow the profile of agriculture in the public collection: photographs, government reports, farm journals and records, agricultural research projects and publications.

JAMES COOK SYMPOSIUM

In 1762 St. John's was captured by French forces and in September of that year was recaptured by the English in the last battle of the Seven Years War. The Master of the flagship of the English fleet was James Cook who was already recognized by the Admiralty for his surveying and mapping skills. From 1762 to 1768 Cook would spend his summers charting the coast of Newfoundland and part of Labrador, producing charts that were so accurate that some were still in use well into the twentieth century. In September 2012 the Newfoundland Historical Society will hold a James Cook Symposium to mark the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of Cook's first landing in St. John's. The Province has plans for a number of events to commemorate World War I (1914-1918), and the NHS has been asked to organize a symposium to begin them. It will be working closely with the provincial government and the Newfoundland Regiment in preparation for this event.

MURDER IN NEWFOUNDLAND

All of our monthly meetings are special, but in March we have something a little different to look forward to.

In 1833, John Snow of Salmon Cove, Bay de Grave, disappeared. Subsequently his wife, Catherine (Mandeville) Snow, his servant Arthur Spring and Tobias Mandeville were charged with murder. At the end of the trial, all three were sentenced to death by hanging. However, Catherine Snow was pregnant and her execution was delayed until 1834.

There is some reason to believe that trial procedures were unfair to Catherine Snow. The procedure for jury selection, the judge's charge to the jury and general religious bias contributed to her being found guilty.

Was she guilty? In March 2012 prominent Newfoundland lawyers will reopen the case. The judge will charge the jury and a verdict will be found. The audience in the March meeting of the Newfoundland Historical Society will be the jury. Make sure you are there.


NHS HERITAGE AWARD
